New Beginnings

In October 2017, Abhayagiri narrowly escaped major damage from wildfires that encroached upon the property on three sides. In Spring 2018, the community celebrated the completion of the new reception hall with the largest ceremony in the monastery's history. Most significantly, the community honored decades of service by its abbot, Luang Por Pasanno, who left for a yearlong retreat overseas. He will return as the community's Guiding Elder in 2019, leaving the monastery under the active leadership of coabbots Ajahn Karuṇadhammo and Ajahn Ñāṇiko.



After the Fire

Following the October 2017 fires that almost destroyed the monastery, friends of Abhayagiri, both at home and in Thailand, helped set up a fund for fire clearance and maintenance.

The community worked to expand on existing fire safety measures in and around the property. In addition to hiring the Student Conservation Association and others to help, the monastic community itself spent many months working in the forest to cut and haul dead wood from near monks' huts and to enlarge the defensible space around monastery buildings.

While more remains to be done, the generosity and work of the community and its supporters has helped to make the monastery safer than ever before.































Winter Retreat

The community entered its annual winter retreat with a New Year's Day celebration. For three months, the monks deepened their formal meditation practice by putting aside all work and entering into noble silence.















Celebrations and Farewells

To Thailand

Led by Luang Por Pasanno, a group from Abhayagiri attended the hundredth anniversary celebration of Luang Por Chah's birth in Thailand. During the January trip, they paid respects to Thailand's Supreme Patriarch (*opposite*), *gave a talk* at the Buddhadasa Indapanyo Archive (BIA) in Bangkok (*middle-right*), and visited Ajahn Siripañño at Dtao Dtum, the monastery Luang Por Pasanno founded on the Thai-Burmese border (*lower-right*).





Under the Bodhi Tree

Ajahn Ñāṇiko traveled to India to meditate ten hours each day with Ajahn Achalo under the tree of the Buddha's enlightenment in Bodh Gaya. When he returned to Abhayagiri in late March, he had sat a total of 1080 hours under the Bodhi tree, completing his offering of faith as Ajahn Achalo finished sitting his 3000th hour.




















The Practice of Service






































Cloister Progress














Leaving One Home to Find Another

Luang Por Liem, abbot of Wat Nong Pah Pong and successor to Luang Por Chah traveled from Thailand to join the festivities.




Gathering with Old Friends

Yosemite

Every year at the beginning of September, several members of the Abhayagiri community travel to Yosemite National Park to camp and practice in the wilderness. The cold air serves as a wake-up call to meditate and the mountains as an invitation to walk. Led by Ajahn Ñāņiko, the group enshrined a small stone chedi of holy objects at the top of Mount Dana.





Luang Por Amaro

Luang Por Amaro came from England to visit the monastery he helped found over twenty years earlier. During his two-week stay, he helped celebrate Abhayagiri's Kathina, gave teachings at City of Ten Thousand Buddhas Monastery and Stanford, and advised the younger monks on how to grow as a community.





Kaṭhina

Following a 2,500-year-old tradition, the laity and monastics gathered at the end of the annual Rains Retreat to offer gifts and celebrate a harmonious community. Luang Por Amaro and Ajahn Jayanto offered teachings while Abhayagiri monks kept the tradition of working together to cut, sew, and dye offered cloth. Before the next dawn, they had made a robe for one honored monk within the monastery.















Looking to Spring

With Luang Por Pasanno still abroad, Ajahn Karuṇadhammo and Ajahn Ñāṇiko guide the community toward the stillness of the 2019 winter retreat.
